INSITE Multi-Factor Authentication

INSITE users will be required to log-in using multi-factor authentication (MFA). This added layer of security helps protect the system and typically takes only a few seconds to complete.

Why Does MFA Matter?

Protects Sensitive Information

MFA adds an extra layer of security to help safeguard criminal justice data and personal information stored in the system.

Prevents Unauthorized Access

Even if a password is compromised, MFA helps ensure that only authorized users can access the system.

Supports Public Safety

Protecting system access helps ensure that data stored in INSITE remains secure and helps prevent system vulnerabilities that could disrupt Compact operations.

Meets Federal Requirements

MFA is required under the FBI's CJIS Security Policy for systems that store, process, or transmit criminal justice information.

Why is MFA Required?

The Commission's national data system must comply with the FBI's CJIS Security Policy, which requires MFA for access to systems that store, process, or transmit criminal justice information. This requirement applies to all national criminal justice systems to help protect sensitive data and reduce the risk of unauthorized access. MFA is a mandatory security requirement and is not optional.

Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA) requires users to verify their identity using two steps before accessing a system, by entering a password and then confirming with a one-time code sent to a mobile device or authentication app.
